In **Plenary Session–II**, the seminar continued on the theme "AYUSH for Viksit Bharat," focusing on the transformative potential of traditional health systems in shaping a self-reliant and developed India.

Dr. Abdul GAffar Taluka Health Officer from Chincholi, gave an insightful talk on the integration of the AYUSH (Ayurveda, Yoga, Unani, Siddha, and Homeopathy) health system with the modern healthcare system. His presentation focused on the potential benefits of combining the strengths of both systems to offer a more holistic and effective approach to healthcare.Mr. Gafar emphasized that AYUSH systems, with their focus on prevention, lifestyle management, and natural remedies, can complement modern medicine, which primarily focuses on treating diseases. He discussed how integrating these systems can provide more comprehensive patient care, addressing both the physical and emotional well-being of individuals. He also highlighted the growing importance of collaboration between AYUSH practitioners and modern healthcare providers in offering better healthcare services to the community, particularly in rural areas where access to healthcare facilities is limited. He spoke about the use of traditional practices like Ayurveda and Yoga for managing chronic conditions, improving immunity, and preventing lifestyle diseases, and how they can be effectively integrated with modern treatment modalities for enhanced outcomes. Moreover, Mr. Gafar mentioned that such integration could lead to the development of integrated treatment protocols that bring together the best of both worlds the evidence-based practices of modern medicine and the time-tested methods of the AYUSH system. He also highlighted the increasing recognition of AYUSH in public health initiatives, with the government incorporating these practices into the national health policy to

provide more accessible and affordable healthcare options. In conclusion, Abdul Gafar stressed the need for more collaborative efforts between AYUSH practitioners and modern healthcare professionals, as well as the importance of promoting research and education in integrated healthcare. By embracing both systems, he suggested, India could enhance its overall healthcare delivery, ensuring a more patient-centered, sustainable, and inclusive approach to health.

Dr. Naycemunnisa MD (Homeo), **Professor and Head, Department of Practice of Medicine**, provided a comprehensive overview of the contributions of Homeopathy in preventive and curative healthcare. She stressed the importance of public awareness and accessibility of AYUSH systems in rural and underserved regions. Specifically focusing on the role of Homeopathy in geriatric care. In her presentation, titled "Safe Shoulder of Homeopathy in Geriatrics", she highlighted how Homeopathy can offer safe and effective treatment options for elderly individuals, addressing the unique health challenges they face. Resource person has discussed the various benefits of Homeopathic remedies in managing age-related health conditions, including chronic ailments, mobility issues, cognitive decline, and more. Emphasizing the holistic approach of Homeopathy, she explained that treatments are tailored to the individual's physical, emotional, and mental health, making it particularly suitable for the elderly population. Homeopathy is known for its minimal side effects, which makes it a safer alternative compared to many conventional treatments, especially for seniors who often have multiple comorbidities and are on polypharmacy.

She also highlighted the preventive aspects of Homeopathy in geriatrics, stressing its potential in boosting immunity, improving overall well-being, and preventing the onset of common age-related conditions like arthritis, diabetes, and cardiovascular diseases. By addressing the root causes of health issues rather than just alleviating symptoms, Homeopathy offers long-term benefits to elderly patients. The resource person concluded by reaffirming the importance of integrating Homeopathy into geriatric healthcare, ensuring that elderly individuals receive comprehensive, personalized, and safe treatment options for maintaining their health and quality of life.

Dr. G. Swathi, Assistant Professor, **Department of Zoology**, **GFGC Nagari**, **Andhra Pradesh**, shared an interdisciplinary perspective, exploring the biological basis and scientific relevance of AYUSH practices in improving immunity and public health outcomes.

Nature's Wisdom for a Healthy Mind: Herbal Bioactives in Neurological Care: Herbal bioactive components have garnered significant attention for their potential neuroprotective effects in treating various neurological disorders. These disorders, including Alzheimer's Disease, Parkinson's Disease,

Multiple Sclerosis, Epilepsy, and mood disorders like Depression and Anxiety, are characterized by neurodegeneration, inflammation, and oxidative stress, areas where herbal remedies show promise.

For Alzheimer's Disease, certain herbs exhibit anti-amyloidogenic and anti-tau properties, alongside anti-inflammatory and antioxidant effects, potentially slowing the disease's progression. In Parkinson's Disease, herbal components demonstrate antioxidant and anti-inflammatory actions, with some studies suggesting a reduction in alpha-synuclein aggregation, a protein linked to the disease. Multiple Sclerosis (MS) is also addressed by herbs with anti-inflammatory and immunomodulatory effects, which may help manage MS-related inflammation and immune responses. For Stroke, antioxidants and anti-inflammatory compounds from herbs may reduce neuronal damage. Similarly, in Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), compounds like curculmas have shown promise in reducing inflammation and oxidative stress. Depression and Anxiety disorders might also benefit from herbal remedies, with curcumin suggesting antidepressant-like effects. The primary objectives of research in this area include identifying bioactive compounds in herbal remedies with neuroprotective properties, understanding their mechanisms of action, and evaluating their safety and efficacy. The hypothesis driving this research is that specific herbal remedies containing targeted bioactive compounds will offer therapeutic benefits and neuroprotective effects for these neurological disorders.

Notable examples of such herbs include **Ashwagandha**, an adaptogen that reduces stress and has neuroprotective properties. It may alleviate anxiety and improve cognitive function by modulating the GABAergic system and protecting neurons from oxidative stress and inflammation. **Gotu Kola**, traditionally used for cognitive enhancement, may improve memory, learning, and mood through its promotion of nerve growth factor (NGF) and its antioxidant and anti-inflammatory effects. Both herbs contain key bioactive compounds, such as triterpenoid saponins in Ashwagandha and asiaticoside in Gotu Kola, which are believed to contribute to their neuroprotective actions. In conclusion, herbal bioactives offer a promising avenue for treating neurological disorders, providing potential benefits in neuroprotection and therapeutic efficacy. The research into these natural remedies could pave the way for innovative and complementary approaches to managing neurological health.

Plenary Session – III: "INDIAN KNOWLEDGE SYSTEM"

Plenary Session–III was dedicated to deepening the understanding of India's intellectual and healthcare heritage through two interconnected themes: "Indian Knowledge System" The session featured esteemed scholars and practitioners who provided valuable insights into India's traditional wisdom and its relevance to modern nation-building.

Resource person of the Session Shri Ashok Patil, Senior Educationist from Chincholi, further expanded on the Indian Knowledge System, stressing the importance of reintroducing ancient Indian pedagogical methods in today's academic curriculum. He advocated for a holistic model of education rooted in Indian ethos to foster critical thinking and cultural pride among youth. Shri Ashok Patil, a Senior Educationist from Chincholi, was the resource person for the session and delivered a profound discussion on the *Indian Knowledge System* (IKS). He emphasized the importance of reintroducing ancient Indian pedagogical methods into modern academic curricula. Shri Patil drew attention to the rich heritage of India's education system, which is deeply rooted in philosophical, spiritual, and cultural teachings.

He discussed the significance of classical texts like the Puranas, Bhagavad Gita, Smritis, and Upanishads, which have been the cornerstone of Indian education for centuries. Shri Patil emphasized that these texts not only contain profound philosophical insights but also practical knowledge on ethics, governance, and personal development. He highlighted how incorporating these ancient texts into the curriculum can provide students with a holistic understanding of life and society, fostering both intellectual and moral growth. Furthermore, he highlighted the concepts of *Shravan* (listening), *Samskar* (values and character building), and *Yoga* (holistic well-being) as essential elements of the Indian knowledge system that can greatly benefit modern education. Shri Patil also stressed the *Guru-Shishya Parampara* (teacher-student tradition), which emphasizes a deep, personal connection between educators and learners, focusing on mentorship, knowledge transfer, and values.

In addition to the academic aspects, Shri Patil discussed the importance of instilling social concern, self-sacrifice, and service to society in today's youth. He called for a revival of the sense of duty and responsibility towards society that was prevalent in ancient India. He highlighted that the youth should be encouraged to take decisive actions in shaping the future of India, emphasizing the role of values and nationalistic spirit in determining the country's path forward. Shri Patil concluded by stressing that the youth of today hold the key to how India will stand in the future. By integrating the wisdom of the Indian Knowledge System with contemporary education, the nation can empower its young citizens to contribute meaningfully to India's growth and development in the coming years. He urged educational institutions to promote this balanced approach of combining tradition with modernity to build a progressive and enlightened society.

Resource person of the Session Dr. Umashankar, an AYUSH Doctor at the Taluk Hospital, Chincholi, presented a detailed seminar on "AYUSH for Viksit Bharat." He focused on the practical applications of AYUSH in rural healthcare delivery, emphasizing its affordability, preventive approach, and community acceptance. His insights underscored AYUSH's potential to serve as a pillar in achieving universal health coverage and national wellness. Dr. Umashankar, an AYUSH doctor at the Taluk Hospital in Chincholi, served as the resource person for the session and delivered a comprehensive seminar on "AYUSH for Viksit Bharat." In his presentation, Dr. Umashankar emphasized the vital role of AYUSH (Ayurveda, Yoga, Unani, Siddha, and Homeopathy) in contributing to India's vision of becoming a Viksit Bharat or a developed India by 2047. He discussed how AYUSH systems, with their focus on holistic and preventive healthcare, can significantly improve the overall well-being of the population. Dr. Umashankar highlighted the benefits of integrating traditional healing practices with modern healthcare strategies to address the

health challenges facing India, especially in rural and underserved areas. He explored how AYUSH therapies could complement conventional medical treatments and provide sustainable, accessible, and affordable healthcare options to the masses.

Shri Naganna S. Ghanti delivered speech on The Role of Indian Traditions in Achieving a Developed India

Shri Naganna S. Ghanti, our esteemed Chief Guest, delivered an inspiring and thought-provoking address on the vital role that **Indian traditions** play in shaping a **Developed India (Viksit Bharat)**.

He began by emphasizing that India's civilizational wisdom, deeply rooted in its spiritual, cultural, and philosophical traditions, is not just a heritage of the past but a guiding force for the future. According to him, development should not be seen merely in terms of GDP or infrastructure, but as **holistic progress** encompassing **moral**, **spiritual**, **ecological**, **and emotional well-being**. He elaborated on several core aspects of Indian traditions that contribute to nation-building:

Value-Based Living, family system, Sustainability and Environmental Harmony, Traditional Knowledge Systems and Spiritual Resilience and Inner Strength. Indian Traditions like *dharma*, *seva* (selfless service), and *satyam* (truth) have been at the heart of Indian society. These values cultivate responsible citizenship and ethical governance, which are essential for sustainable development. Shri Ghanti highlighted how the Indian joint family system, mutual respect for elders, and community-centered practices foster social security and emotional stability—aspects that are increasingly valuable in today's fast-paced world. Citing ancient practices such as *Vruksha Devata* (tree worship), water conservation rituals, and seasonal dietary customs, he stressed how Indian traditions have always promoted **eco-friendly living**, aligning with modern concepts of sustainable development.

He pointed out that disciplines such as **Ayurveda**, **Yoga**, **Vastu Shastra**, and indigenous agricultural practices carry immense potential for contributing to health, wellness, and innovation when integrated with modern science. Indian traditions foster a deep sense of self-awareness, mindfulness, and inner peace. These spiritual values, he said, are crucial for mental health, leadership, and resilience especially in times of crisis. Shri Ghanti concluded by stating that the path to a **Viksit Bharat** must be uniquely Indian drawing strength from our timeless traditions while embracing innovation and global progress. He called upon educators, youth, and policymakers to take pride in their heritage and use it as a foundation for building a **self-reliant**, **inclusive**, **and enlightened India**.

Way Forward: by Principal about Indian Knowledge System and AYUSH for Viksit Bharat

To achieve the goal of Viksit Bharat (Developed India), the Indian Knowledge System (IKS) and AYUSH (Ayurveda, Yoga & Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha, and Homeopathy) must be incorporated into the national development agenda. The following actions are crucial as we proceed: Including IKS and AYUSH concepts in curricula at the school and university levels can promote respect and appreciation of India's scientific and cultural legacy. It is necessary to encourage interdisciplinary research that connects traditional knowledge with contemporary science. Encouraging Evidence-Based Research, Clinical studies and thorough scientific validation are necessary to support AYUSH

systems. Credibility and international acceptance can be increased by establishing Centers of Excellence and working with international research institutions.

Modern medicine can be enhanced by bolstering primary healthcare delivery through AYUSH methods. Public health strategies should incorporate wellness facilities, preventive care, and lifestyle therapies like yoga for Improving Public Health with AYUSH. Promoting new businesses and ideas based on Indian traditional knowledge, such as sustainable practices and herbal items, can strengthen the economy and provide jobs for Innovation and Entrepreneurship in IKS. To safeguard, advance, and institutionalize IKS and AYUSH, a strong policy framework is required. It is also necessary to protect biodiversity and traditional knowledge through the protection of intellectual property rights (IPR).it needs to y Support Polic for Institutional Framework. Soft power can be derived from India's wealth of traditional knowledge. India can bolster its global leadership by promoting AYUSH internationally through wellness tourism, education, and diplomacy. In conclusion, we may create a sustainable, inclusive, and culturally anchored Viksit Bharat by balancing the knowledge of the Indian Knowledge System and the comprehensive methods of AYUSH with contemporary developmental objectives.


HIGHLIGHTS OF THE CONFERENCE






